From our Pastor:

Dear Friends and Parishioners of Our Lady of Sorrows,

In today's Gospel, a large crowd follows Jesus not because they love His teachings, but because they received free bread. They turn to Jesus to satisfy their physical needs, yet they are never satisfied and eventually leave. This pattern reflects a common issue in our lives when people treat God as a means to achieve their own ends, they are never satisfied and eventually turn to idols for gratification.

St. John Vianney said, "The soul hungers for God, and nothing but God can fulfill it. For Christ came to dwell on earth and assumed a Body in order that this Body might become the true Food of our souls."

I remember a few years ago, around this time of year, I was privileged to take a few days off for a retreat at the Shrine of the Most Blessed Sacrament in Hanceville, Alabama, the home of Mother Angelica. I needed to



spend some quiet days away from the hustle of the world and also to get some physical rest. But when I arrived, full of expectations, something strange started to happen. The more I prayed and adored our Lord in the Blessed Sacrament, the more I experienced a deep emptiness and restlessness within me. This was contrary to my expectation, as I was looking for a peaceful and joyous time with the Lord. So, I decided to bring this experience to the attention of my retreat master. I still remember what he said that this feeling was normal at the beginning of a retreat. The more we grow closer to God, the more we start to realize what is lacking in us and what needs to be fulfilled. Take, for example, if we never go near a mirror with some light on it, we may fool ourselves into thinking we are okay. But the closer we get to the light, the more we realize the defects on our faces.

And that's true with our spiritual life. The more we stay away from Jesus in the Most Blessed Sacrament, the more we fool ourselves into thinking we are fine. But as we grow closer to our Lord, we realize the areas of our lives that need His grace. This is always a common experience among many mystics and Saints in the Catholic (continued on page 3)

Ministries & Reflections



Saint of the Week- St. Dominic

Born in old Castile, Spain in 1170, Dominic was trained for the priesthood by a priest-uncle, studied the arts and theology, and became a canon of the cathedral at Osma. On a journey through France with his bishop, Dominic came face to face with the then virulent Albigensian heresy at Languedoc. The Albigensians-or Cathari, "the pure ones"-held to two principles-one good, one evil-in the world. All matter is evil-hence they denied the Incarnation and the sacraments. On the same principle, they abstained from procreation and took a minimum of food and drink. The inner circle led what some people regarded as a heroic life of purity and asceticism not shared by ordinary followers. Dominic sensed the need for the Church to combat this heresy, and was commissioned to be part of the preaching crusade against it. He saw immediately why the preaching crusade was not succeeding: the ordinary people admired and followed the ascetical heroes of the Albigenses. Understandably, they were not impressed by the Catholic preachers who traveled with horse and retinues, stayed at the best inns and had servants. Dominic therefore, with three Cistercians, began itinerant preaching according to the gospel ideal. He continued this work for 10 years, being successful with the ordinary people but not with the leaders. His fellow preachers gradually became a community, and in 1215 Dominic founded a religious house at Toulouse, the beginning of the Order of Preachers or Dominicans. His order would become incredibly successful, producing four popes, famous saints such as St. Thomas Aquinas, artists, scientists, and more. The operate dozens of schools and colleges throughout the world today. One of their greatest contributions to the Church's life was the promotion of the Rosary. St. Dominic even has a country named after him- the Dominican Republic. St. Dominic died in 1221 and was canonized 13 years later by Pope Gregory IX.

Saint John Paul II said, "God has placed in human hearts a 'hunger' which will be satisfied only by full union with Him. Eucharistic communion was given so that we might be sated with God here on earth, in expectation of our complete fulfillment in heaven."
