

<u>IN MARY'S T</u>EARS AND SORROWS WE FIND GRACE

From our Pastoral Associate:

Today marks the 101st anniversary of our parish church's dedication in 1923 and the readings match up well with our parish's patron of Our Lady of Sorrows. Our first reading comes from one of Isaiah' Suffering Servant passages, that details the suffering of a servant of God who undergoes painful torments for the sake of salvation. The Church has always understood these passages to refer to Christ directly; the most famous passage is read on Good Friday: "But he was pierced for our offenses, crushed for our sins; upon him was the chastisement that makes us whole, by his stripes we are healed." (Is 53:5) Mary and Jesus were so united in mind and spirit that his wounds were her wounds. His sufferings were hers. His crucifixion was also hers. And yet, it is not Mary's sufferings that I want to reflect on here, but her hope.



We know that on Easter morning, Mary Magdalene found the empty tomb and ran back to tell the disciples. In response to this, Peter and John sprint to the tomb. But why did they run? Was it horror that Jesus had been taken away in the night? Or was it something else? We know very little of what happened in those intervening days between Cross and Tomb. But we do know that the Apostle John was entrusted by Jesus at the Cross to care for Mary. So we can be sure that as they mourned Jesus' death in the days after his crucifixion, he was with Mary. We also know that Peter, deeply sorrowful for his denial of Christ, returned to them, as he was with them when Mary Magdalene came with news. I think we can be sure that Mary imbued these disciples with a new hope- reminding them of what Jesus told them in our Gospel reading today: that he will rise after three days. Consequently, when Mary Magdalene comes back to tell them the news that the tomb is empty, Peter and John sprint to the empty tomb, to see for themselves if what the Mother of Jesus had hoped for was true. I think this, ultimately, is the meaning of haste, and why they seemed to not even fear that they might encounter the band of soldiers that were supposed to be there to guard the tomb. It is also why John ultimately leaves the tomb believing (Jn 20:8). The race to the tomb indicates Mary's hope.

We likewise should learn from Mary. No matter what sorrows we may face (and they may indeed be great), we should never lose hope in God's promises to us. Mary understands our sufferings, possibly more than anyone else but God. And yet she wishes us to maintain our hope in Christ, to remain confident in the identity of her Son, who loved us so deeply that he did not spurn even the tremendous suffering of the Cross for our sake. I encourage you this day to spend time with her, asking her to help enliven a new hope within your heart and to help you to see beyond the strife and sorrow you may face to what is the most important. I have no doubt that she will do exactly that.

Ministries & Reflections



Saints of the Week-Cornelius and Cyprian

St. Cornelius was elected Pope in 251 during the persecutions of the Emperor Decius. His first challenge, besides the ever present threat of the Roman authorities, was to bring an end to the schism brought on by his rival, the first antipope Novatian. He convened a synod of bishops to confirm him as the rightful successor of Peter. The great controversy that arose as a result of the Decian persecution was whether or not the Church could pardon and receive back into the Church those who had apostatized in the face of martyrdom. Cornelius decreed that they must be welcomed back and insisted that they perform an adequate penance. In 253 Cornelius was exiled by the emperor Gallus and died of the hardships he endured in exile. He is considered a martyr. St. Cyprian was born to wealthy pagans around the year 190, and was educated in the classics and in rhetoric. He converted at the age of 56, was ordained a priest a year later, and made bishop two years after that. His writings are of great importance, especially his treatise on The Unity of the Catholic Church, in which he argues that unity is grounded in the authority of the bishop, and among the bishops, in the primacy of the See of Rome. He was a close friend of Pope Cornelius, and supported him both in his claim to be Pope and his re-admittance of repentant apostates. During the Decian persecutions Cyprian considered it wiser to go into hiding and guide his flock covertly rather than seek the glorious crown of martyrdom, a decision that his enemies attacked him for. On September 14, 258, however, he was martyred during the persecutions of the emperor Valerian.

For Your Reflection

We are celebrating the feast of the cross which drove away darkness and brought in the light. As we keep this feast, we are lifted up with the crucified Christ, leaving behind us earth and sin so that we may gain the things above. So great and outstanding a possession is the cross that he who wins it has won a treasure. Rightly could I call this treasure the fairest of all fair things and the costliest, in fact as well as in name, for on it and through it and for its sake the riches of salvation that had been lost were restored to us.

Had there been no cross, Christ could not have been crucified. Had there been no cross, life itself could not have been nailed to the tree. And if life had not been nailed to it, there would be no streams of immortality pouring from Christ's side, blood and water for the world's cleansing. The legal bond of our sin would not be cancelled, we should not have attained our freedom, we should not have enjoyed the fruit of the tree of life and the gates of paradise would not stand open. Had there been no cross, death would not have been trodden underfoot, nor hell despoiled.

Therefore, the cross is something wonderfully great and honorable. It is great because through the cross the many noble acts of Christ found their consummation—very many indeed, for both his miracles and his sufferings were fully rewarded with victory. The cross is honorable because it is both the sign of God's suffering and the trophy of his victory. It stands for his suffering because on it he freely suffered unto death. But it is also his trophy because it was the means by which the devil was wounded and death conquered; the barred gates of hell were smashed, and the cross became the one common salvation of the whole world.

The cross is called Christ's glory; it is saluted as his triumph. We recognize it as the cup he longed to drink and the climax of the sufferings he endured for our sake. As to the cross being Christ's glory, listen to his words: Now is the Son of Man glorified, and in him God is glorified, and God will glorify him at once. And again: Father, glorify me with the glory I had with you before the world came to be. And once more: Father, glorify your name. Then a voice came from heaven: I have glorified it and I will glorify it again. Here he speaks of the glory that would accrue to him through the cross. And if you would understand that the cross is Christ's triumph, hear what he himself also said: When I am lifted up, then I will draw all men to myself. Now you can see that the cross is Christ's glory and triumph.
