

From our Pastor:

Dear Friends and parishioners, Today, we witness a beautiful miracle in the healing of a man who was born deaf and had a speech impediment. As with any miracle in the Gospel, we can approach it from two levels. The first level is the physical healing itself. We meet a man who could not hear but now, through Christ, can both hear and speak. Imagine the isolation he must have felt, trapped in a world where he could not express his thoughts or emotions. The frustration of being



misunderstood, the inability to enjoy the sounds of life—like music or the voices of loved ones—must have been overwhelming. His deafness isolated him from fully experiencing life.

But beyond the physical healing lies something even more profound; the danger of spiritual deafness. St. Paul reminds us in his Letter to the Romans, "Faith comes through hearing." To grow in our faith, we must be listeners of the Word of God. It is through this connection with God's Word that we find fullness of life.

The deafness of this man symbolizes our own struggles in responding to God's Word. When we become spiritually deaf, our lives turn inward, becoming self-centered. We lose touch with God's guiding voice, and our lives lose purpose and direction. Eventually, this leads to a loss of faith itself.

However, in today's noisy culture, it's difficult to hear God's voice. With so many distractions—constant earphones, endless notifications, and loud environments—we struggle even to hear our own thoughts, let alone God's Word. This addiction to noise leaves many people ignorant of Christ and disconnected from their faith, leading to disorientation in their lives.

Someone once compared faith to a keynote in a beautiful piece of music. Even a great composition, like those of Beethoven, would be reduced to noise if we are not attuned to hear it. The problem isn't the music—it's our ability to appreciate it. Similarly, the Word of God aligns our lives with true happiness and joy, which is found in God Himself.

Ministries & Reflections



Saint of the Week- St. Simon of Cyrene

Saint Simon of Cyrene, also known as Simon the Cyrenian, was a significant figure in the early Christian community during the first century. He is widely recognized for his remarkable act of assisting Jesus Christ in carrying the cross on the way to Calvary. Born in Cyrene, a city located in present-day Libya, Simon was a devout Jew who had traveled to Jerusalem to celebrate the Passover. Simon was compelled by Roman authorities to help Jesus carry the heavy cross upon which he would be crucified. This momentous act of service and sacrifice not only demonstrated Simon's compassion but also symbolized the shared burden of suffering that Christ bore for all humanity. It is believed that this experience deeply affected Simon and led him to become a devoted follower of Jesus. After witnessing the crucifixion and the subsequent resurrection of Christ, Simon embraced his new faith wholeheartedly. He became an ardent disciple and, according to some accounts, accompanied Peter and other apostles in their evangelical missions. Simon's zealous commitment and dedication to spreading the teachings of Jesus made him an indispensable figure in the early Christian community. Simon's apostolic journey eventually led him to France, where he became a pioneering missionary. He settled in Avignon, becoming the region's first bishop. Simon's tireless efforts in proclaiming the Gospel and establishing the foundations of the Christian faith made a lasting impact on the people of Avignon and the surrounding areas. Unfortunately, his commitment to the Christian cause ultimately led to his martyrdom. In the year 100, Simon was crucified, joining the ranks of countless martyrs who sacrificed their lives for their beliefs. Throughout history, Saint Simon of Cyrene has been venerated as a symbol of selflessness and sacrifice. While he is not associated with a specific patronage, many view Simon as a powerful intercessor in times of hardship and struggle.

For Your Reflection

The Lord then goes on to say: Blessed are those who hunger and thirst for righteousness, for they shall be filled. This hunger is not for any bodily food, this thirst is not for any earthly drink: it is a longing to be blessed with righteousness, and, by penetrating the secret of all mysteries, to be filled with the Lord himself. Happy is the soul that longs for the food of righteousness and thirsts for this kind of drink; it would not seek such things if it had not already savored their delight. When the soul hears the voice of the Spirit saying to it through the prophet: Taste and see that the Lord is good, it has already received a portion of God's goodness, and is on fire with love, the love that gives joy of the utmost purity. It counts as nothing all that belongs to time; it is entirely consumed with desire to eat and drink the food of righteousness. The soul lays hold of the true meaning of the first and great commandment: You shall love the Lord God with your whole heart, and your whole mind and your whole strength, for to love God is nothing else than to love righteousness. Finally, just as concern for one's neighbor is added to love of God, so the virtue of mercy is added to the desire for righteousness, as it is said: Blessed are the merciful, for God will be merciful to them. Remember, Christian, the surpassing worth of the wisdom that is yours. Bear in mind the kind of school in which you are to learn your skills, the rewards to which you are called. Mercy itself wishes you to be merciful, righteousness itself wishes you to be righteous, so that the Creator may shine forth in his creature, and the image of God be reflected in the mirror of the human heart as it imitates his qualities. The faith of those who live their faith is a serene faith. What you long for will be given you; what you love will be yours for ever.

Since it is by giving alms that everything is pure for you, you will also receive that blessing which is promised next by the Lord: Blessed are the pure of heart, for they shall see God. Dear friends, great is the happiness of those for whom such a reward is prepared. Who are the clean of heart if not those who strive for those virtues we have mentioned above? What mind can conceive, what words can express the great happiness of seeing God? Yet human nature will achieve this when it has been transformed so that it sees the Godhead no longer in a mirror or obscurely but face to face—the Godhead that no man has been able to see. In the inexpressible joy of this eternal vision, human nature will possess what eye has not seen or ear heard, what man's heart has never conceived. -From a Sermon on the Beatitudes by Pope St. Leo the Great
